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The Colors

"After over 100s years flag finds its way back home"

Beauvoir Stars and Bars Flag By Charles L. Sullivan
Acting on a November 2007 tip about a flag for sale on eBay, Beauvoir Combined
Boards Chairman and Acting Director Richard V. Forte Sr. launched an
investigation that led to the return of the century-old banner. The evidence,

though fragmentary, proved compelling. The provenance sheet related to the flag from Schindler's Antique Shop, a prestigious concern in Charleston, South Carolina, avowed the following: On the staff side of the flag is written in old ink the words "Beau Voir", "1908", "UDC-Richmond" and "James- town." This is taken to mean that this flag is the same pictured in a famous postcard showing two Confederate Veterans holding a rare 13-star "Stars and Bars Flag" in front of Beauvoir. Then, according to the inscription, the United Daughters of the Confederacy took the flag to the Jamestown Exposition of 1907-1908 to



be flown over the Beauvoir replica which served as Mississippi's State Building at that expo. Finally the flag was believed present at the 1908 commemoration of

the Centennial of Jefferson Davis' birth in the dedication of a monument on June 3, 1908, in Richmond. The provenance sheet further states that this flag was "one of a number of Southern state and Confederate flags disposed of by [the U. D. C.]. I [Schindler] presume they were used at various dedication ceremonies." The Schindler provenance sheet closes with the claim that, "As far as I could tell this flag was the only one of all those disposed of by the UDC that had any inscription on it." Forte believes that this Stars and Bars is the one pictured in the E. J. Younghans postcard (bottom) because, "It is a variant with 13 stars instead of seven for the first seceded states. The identifying clincher is the 13th set alone in a circle of stars."

E. J. Younghans owned a Gulfport business which made and sold postcards and tourist souvenirs at the turn of the 20th Century. Most of his postcards bear dates in the early 1900s. The Beauvoir Stars and Bars Flag postcard photograph could have been made as early as December 25, 1903, because the newly-opened Jefferson Davis Confederate Soldiers Home at Beauvoir counted thirteen veterans and a nurse present for Christmas dinner. Thirteen veterans and nurses are pictured on the postcard.

In Forte's words, "This is a true Beauvoir artifact, not a Jefferson Davis artifact or a Civil War artifact and that is what makes its return so important." Don and Nancy Barrett of Lexington, Mississippi, purchased the flag at auction and presented it to Beauvoir.
