The Colors

The flag of the 3rd Miss. Inf. Reg.

This is the Confederate flag of Company H of the 3rd Mississippi Infantry, CSA known as the Dahlgren Guard that was mustered into service in Pass Christian, Mississippi, on September 4, 1861, and commanded by Colonel John Deason. The Pass Christian Dahlgren Guards was headed by Lt. Colonel Thomas A. Mellon during their encampment at Camp Tugville. In the early months of 1862, the women of Pass Christian raised their spirits by creating this flag. The Dahlgren Guards presented it as the regimental flag for the



3rd Mississippi Regiment, but it was lost during its first confrontation with the Union Army. The flag was captured by Union soldiers on April 4, 1862. Following the war, it was returned on Connecticut Day at the New Orleans Exposition on February 26, 1885. The Connecticut volunteers stitched the blue silk canton, red wool fringe, and magnolia leaves of green painted paper to a full flag-sized piece of white silk. The lettering describes what remained of the original flag. Three silk ribbons for attaching the flag to a pole were also stitched to the white silk along the hoist end.
